- 1. Open the carton and lift out the FCO assembly.
- **2.** Remove the packing material from the FCO assembly and put it back into the carton.

Be sure to save the shipping carton and packing material in case reshipment should ever become necessary.

# 3.1 General Description

The Fibre Channel Option (FCO) connects TLS-4000, 412xxx, 8000 and 88xxx libraries to Fibre Channel (FC).

There are three Fibre Channel Option configurations available for single and dual bay TLS libraries. Type C models incorporate a single channel Fibre Channel router, enclosed in an assembly, mounted to the back of the TLS library. Type B and ATTO<sup>TM</sup> models contain a dual channel Fibre Channel router and are designed to be rack mountable.

Fibre Channel Option Type C for TLS-84xx libraries are installed when they are shipped from the factory. All other models have the Fibre Channel Option shipped separately from the libraries and require installation in the field. They are attached to the rear of the TLS, taking the place of the rear service panel.

The installation and operation of the various library models is virtually identical. Models 412xxx and 88xxx are referred to as dual bay libraries because they contain dual drive bays. All other TLS models are single bay libraries. Differences among the models are noted where required.





Figure 3-1 Type C Fibre Channel Option Installed on a TLS-4000 Library







Figure 3-2 Type B Fibre Channel Option Installed next to a TLS-412xxx Library






Figure 3-3 ATTO Fibre Channel Option Installed next to a TLS-412xxx Library

# 4.1 Fibre Channel Option (FCO) Type C Installation Considerations

## 4.1.1 Operating Environment

A TLS with the Fibre Channel Option is designed to operate in an ambient environment from  $41^{\circ}$ F to  $95^{\circ}$ F ( $5^{\circ}$ C to  $35^{\circ}$ C), 20% to 80% relative humidity, and at altitudes from -1000 to +10,000 feet. Moisture must not be allowed to condense inside the system.

## 4.1.2 Ventilation

When selecting a location for the TLS, be sure to provide sufficient space behind the unit to allow for cable connections. Also, be sure nothing will block the air intake at the inlet air filters or the top air vent slots.

# 4.2 FCO Type C Interconnect Cabling

The Fibre Channel Option for TLS-84xx libraries is installed when they are shipped from the factory. All other models have the Fibre Channel Option shipped separately from the libraries and require installation in the field. They are attached to the rear of the TLS, taking the place of the rear service panel. All the bridge/router interconnect cables are accessed at the rear of the unit.




Figure 4-1 Bottom View of the Type C Fibre Channel Bridge/Router (FCO)

The following table briefly describes the components located on the bottom of the FCO.

Component	Description
Fibre Channel 0	Small Form Factor Pluggable (SFP) transceiver socket. The receptacle is a 2 Gbit Fibre Channel SFP transceiver.
SCSI Channel 0 and 1	The SCSI Ultra 160 channels used to attach the TLS medium changer and tape drives.
Serial Jumper Connectors	The serial bridge cable provides a serial communication link between the FCO and the TLS library. This interface is used to configure the FCO.
Reset Button	The reset button is used to reset the Q-Link processor.
Q-Link 10 BaseT	The Q-Link Ethernet interface connection.
Activity LED (Fibre Channel)	On (green) when the Fibre Channel is active. Off when there is no Fibre Channel I/O activity.
Link LED (Fibre Channel)	On (green) when the Fibre Channel link is connected and established. Off when the Fibre Channel link is disconnected and/or not established.
Activity Channel 0 &1 LEDs (SCSI)	On (green) when SCSI bus is active or busy.
Fault LED	Solid on (red) when a fatal error condition is present. This indicator will be on during power-on diagnostics, and is extinguished after successful completion of the power-on sequence.
Status OK LED	Solid on (yellow) when the FCO is operational.
+5V FCO LED	Solid on (green) when the FCO +5volt power is present.
+5V EXEC LED	Solid on (green) when the Executive PCBA +5volt power is present.
+12V LED	Solid on (green) when the Executive PCBA +12volt power is present.
Link LED (Q-Link)	Solid on (green) when the 10BaseT link is connected.
Activity LED (Q-Link)	On (yellow) when then 10BaseT link is active or busy.

# 4.3 Cabling for TLS-42xx (using AIT-3 or 5 Tape Drives), TLS-44xx and TLS-46120 (using AIT-3 Tape Drives)

Note that all TLS models are shipped from the factory without the SCSI interconnect cables or terminators installed. The following figures and tables represent the pre-ferred cabling for a library with two to six tape drives.




Figure 4-2 TLS-42xx Cabling Diagram




Figure 4-3 TLS-44xx Cabling Diagram using AIT-3 Tape Drives




Figure 4-4 TLS-46xxx Cabling Diagram using AIT-3 Tape Drives

# 4.4 Cabling for TLS-8000 and 88xxx Libraries

Prior to installing a Fibre Channel Option on TLS-8000 or 88xxx libraries the tape drive assemblies may need to be installed in the library and the drives will need to be cabled as shown in this section. Refer to the Installation section in the TLS-5000/6000/8000 Installation and Operation Manual (Qualstar document number 501450) for details about tape drive assembly preparation, enabling SCSI termination power and installation.

Note that all TLS models are shipped from the factory without the SCSI interconnect cables or terminators installed.

The following figures and tables represent the preferred cabling for a library with two to eight tape drives.




Figure 4-5 TLS-82xx Cabling Diagram




Figure 4-6 TLS-84xx Cabling Diagram




Figure 4-7 TLS-88xxx Cabling Diagram

# 4.5 Installing a Fibre Channel Option

CAUTION

Be sure to turn the library's power off before installing or removing a Fibre Channel Option.

### 4.5.1 Installation

The following steps outline the actions necessary to install a Fibre Channel Option onto a library.

- **1.** Remove power from the TLS: first turn the power switch off and then remove the power cord.




Figure 4-8 Service Panel

- 2. Using a Phillips screwdriver remove the six screws securing the service panel on the rear of the library refer to Figure 4-8. Depending of the model of library, the service panel may not have ventilation slots. Care must be taken to not remove the four screws securing the heatsink panels. Save the service panel for possible future use.






Figure 4-9 Rear View of TLS

- **3.** Place the lower lip of the FCO inside the bottom edge of the service panel opening and tilt the FCO upwards, making sure that the heatsink panel screws align with the openings in the FCO. See Figure 4-9. The hinge surfaces should rest flat against the rear of the library.
- 4. Using a Phillips screwdriver, secure the FCO to the rear of the library at the FCO's two top captive screws. See Figure 4-9.
- **5.** Using two of the screws that were removed with the service panel, attach the FCO's two hinges to the rear of the library. See Figure 4-9.

**6.** Loosen the two top captive screws on the FCO that were tightened in step number four. Carefully guide the FCO backwards as it pivots on the hinges and comes to its open position. See Figure 4-10.

**7.** Connect the AUXPWR cable to the AUXPWR connector on the Executive PCBA and to the PWRIN connector on the Fibre Channel Option. See Figure 4-11 and Figure 4-13.




Figure 4-12 Executive PCBA Identification

8. The FCO's SERIAL ribbon cable will connect to differently named connectors on the Executive PCBA depending on which version of Executive PCBA is installed in the library. Executive III PCBA's will have part number 501387-printed on them and Executive IV boards will have part number 501447- on them. Refer to Figure 4-12 to determine which version of Executive PCBA the FCO is being connected to.






Figure 4-13 Detail of Connections (Executive IV PCBA Shown)

- **9.** Make sure that the Red edge of the ribbon cable faces to the right side when the cable is installed. Connect the SERIAL ribbon cable to the SERIAL connector on Executive III PCBA's or to the SERLA connector on Executive IV PCBA's. Route the SERIAL cable under the AUXPWR cable as shown in Figure 4-11 and connect it to the FCO\_A connector on the FCO (Figure 4-13).
- 10. For those FCOs that also have Q-Link, connect the second SERIAL ribbon cable to the SERLB connector on the Executive IV PCBA. Route the second SERIAL cable under the AUXPWR cable as shown in Figure 4-11 and connect it to the Q\_LINK connector on the FCO (Figure 4-13).

- 11. Carefully lift the FCO until it touches the rear of the TLS. Using a Phillips screwdriver, secure the Fibre Channel Option to the rear of the TLS by tightening all four of the captive screws. Refer to Figure 4-9 for captive screw locations.
- 12. Install the FCO serial communication bridge cable. The serial communication bridge cable is a short telephone type cable with a six-conductor RJ11 plug on each end. Insert each ended of the serial communication bridge cable (P/N-510149-01-6) into the RJ11 jacks on the FCO. See Figure 4-14.




Figure 4-16 Inserting SFP Adapter into Fibre Channel Option

13. Prepare to insert the appropriate SFP (Small Form Factor Pluggable) transceiver into the FCO. Note that the SFP adapter is keyed and the small circuit board connector is facing you when oriented correctly. See Figure 4-15. Locate the rectangular opening in the bottom of the Fibre Channel Option and insert the SFP transceiver connector end first. Then carefully guide the SFP transceiver into the FCO until it clicks into place. Refer to Figure 4-16.

#### Figure 4-15 End View of Small Form Factor Pluggable Transceiver

## 4.6 Initializing the Fibre Channel Option

After physically installing the Fibre Channel Option onto the library, disconnect (if connected) the Fibre Channel Option from the FC host or Hub to avoid affecting any operational systems.

NOTE

Refer to the applicable TLS Installation and Operation manual for instructions on using the TLS Library and its menus.

Apply power to the TLS library. During initialization, the library will reposition the cartridge handler and tape magazine carrousel. The tape drives and magazines will be scanned to inventory the contents of the library. The third line of the LCD displays the status of these operations.

If the Fibre Channel Option (FCO) is enabled and busy, it will also display status information on the third line of the LCD. If there is more than one message to be displayed, they will cycle at one-second intervals. Table 4-8 shows the possible messages that can appear while the FCO is initializing.

On single Fibre Channel Option installations, status messages are prefixed with "FC:". On dual installations, status messages for the left module are prefixed with "FCL:" and status messages for right module are prefixed with "FCR.". The right and left module's statue messages will alternate.

Note that on dual bay libraries with two Fibre Channel Options installed the left or right FCO will be specified in the message. Pressing the ENTER key will clear the message.

This warning message can be caused by an incorrectly installed serial cable. If the message reoccurs after checking the cables and clearing the message using the EN-TER key several times, it may require power cycling the library, to reset the FCO. If this problem occurs, please contact the Technical Support department at Qualstar so that corrective action can be taken.

The initialization procedure can take up to several minutes. If the host system is started while FCO status messages are still present, the host may miss seeing the Fibre Channel devices because the system is still busy. The host should be instructed to scan for Fibre Channel devices after the FCO has been configured and line three is clear in the TLS Library's LCD display.

# 4.7 Configuring the Fibre Channel Loop ID

The Id Mode must be configured for either "Soft" or "Fixed" addressing. Using "Soft" addressing, the Fibre Channel Option connects to an arbitrated loop using the first available AL\_PA, scanning from the highest valid address to the lowest. Using "Fixed" addressing, the user selects a specific arbitrated loop address (AL\_PA) to connect with. If the selected address is not available, the Fibre Channel Option will connect with the first available address it finds. The use of "Soft" or "Fixed" addressing is based on the user's installation requirements.

Soft addressing can be configured when address conflicts are not likely. If the Fibre Channel Option is connected directly to the computer's HBA (Host Bus Adapter), the selection of a specific Loop Id is not usually required. For example, Emulex HBA drivers scan for an available address starting from the low Fibre Channel address range. The FCO begins scanning for an available address starting from the high Fibre Channel address range. This avoids address conflicts and the FCO Loop Id will be assigned the same value each time it is restarted.

Hard addressing should be configured if address conflicts can occur. This can happen if the FCO is connected to a Fibre Channel Hub. Since many HBA drivers map the Fibre Channel Loop Id to a SCSI Bus/Target address, this mandates that the Fibre Channel Loop Id be very stable, and cannot be allowed to change if the system is simply restarted. This might happen if soft addressing were used and the Fibre Channel Option found its previous address taken. Selecting a fixed address is a way to prevent the FCO Loop Id from changing if the system is restarted.

If the computer's HBA uses the World Wide Port Name (WWPN) convention instead of the Loop Id to map to a SCSI Bus/Target/Lun address, the value of the Loop Id is no longer important. The WWPN is always unique and consistent under all conditions. In the future, all addressing will likely use the WWPN.

The Configuration\Fibre Channel menu panel displays the SCSI device interface and configures the Fibre Channel Interface to host. The menu sets the Fibre Channel Option host topology. The "Topology" has two selections, LOOP and FABRIC. The LOOP selection configures the Fibre Channel Option for Arbitrated Loop (FC-AL) operation. The FABRIC selection configures the Fibre Channel Option for Switch Fabric (FC\_SW) operation. If the mode is LOOP, the Id Mode and Loop Id entries are available. The Id Mode menu item has two selections, FIXED or SOFT. If the mode is FIXED, the Loop Id entry is displayed. If the Id Mode is SOFT, the Loop ID is automatically assigned by the FCO.

During the Fibre Channel Arbitrated Loop (FC-AL) initialization process, a unique Arbitrated Loop Physical Address (AL\_PA) value is assigned to each port on the loop. Not all of the 256 hex values are allowed as AL\_PA values per FC-AL. The Loop Id value is used to represent the 126 addresses that the FCO can use. Table 7-1 shows how a Loop Id value maps to an AL\_PA. If the Id Mode is "SOFT", the FCO will attempt to obtain an available Loop Id, in the following order: 0, 1, 2, etc.

## 4.8 Configuring the Fibre Channel SCSI Devices Interface

To establish the SCSI device configuration the Fibre Channel Option is commanded to "Rescan" its three SCSI device buses. The three SCSI device channels, starting with Channel 0, begin scanning for SCSI devices using ascending SCSI Target Ids. After all three channels have been scanned, the FCO builds a SCSI device table, that it uses to map SCSI Targets to the host as logical devices (LUNs).



For single bay libraries or dual bay libraries with only one Fibre Channel Option installed, press the (UP) or (DOWN) key to move the pointer to Device. Press the ENTER key to enter the Configuration\Fibre Channel\Device menu.

For dual bay libraries with two Fibre Channel Options installed, press the (UP) or (DOWN) key to move the pointer to either Device Left or Device Right. The left and right orientation is as viewed from the front of the library. Press the ENTER key to enter the Configuration\Fibre Channel\Device (Left or Right) menu.

The Configuration\Fibre Channel\Device menu panels display a list of SCSI devices attached to the Fibre Channel Option. C TLS library with a single Fibre Channel Option displays the title CFC....Device. A dual-bay library with two Fibre Channel Options installed, displays the title CFC....Device Left or CFC....Device Right to correspond to the Fibre Channel Option in the left and right side.



The Fibre Channel Option assembles a list of SCSI devices it detects on its three SCSI channels. This menu displays the SCSI devices that a Fibre Channel Option has detected. To initiate the scan operation, press the (DOWN) key to move the pointer to RESCAN and press the ENTER key. The RESCAN item will disappear and return when the operation completes.

The RESCAN operation should be performed with the Library disconnected from the host. The Fibre Channel Option is restarted and SCSI device address maybe modified.

Press the EXIT key to return to the top LCD display and wait for the third line to clear of status messages.

# 5.1 Fibre Channel Option (FCO) Type B Installation Considerations

## 5.1.1 Operating Environment

A TLS with the Fibre Channel Option is designed to operate in an ambient environment from  $41^{\circ}$ F to  $95^{\circ}$ F ( $5^{\circ}$ C to  $35^{\circ}$ C), 20% to 80% relative humidity, and at altitudes from -1000 to +10,000 feet. Moisture must not be allowed to condense inside the system.

## 5.1.2 Ventilation

When selecting a location for the TLS, be sure to provide sufficient space behind the unit to allow for cable connections. Also, be sure nothing will block the air intake at the inlet air filters or the top air vent slots. The Fibre Channel Option is designed to be rack mounted so be sure to allow sufficient space behind the unit to allow for cable connections and space around it for air flow.

# 5.2 FCO Type B Interconnect Cabling

All the bridge/router interconnect and power cables are accessed at the rear of the unit.





Figure 5-1 Rear View of the Type B Fibre Channel Bridge/Router (FCO)






Figure 5-4 Connector Locations on the Rear of the TLS-412xxx




Figure 5-5 TLS-412xxx Cabling Diagram for 12 AIT-3 Tape Drives




Figure 5-6 TLS-412xxx Cabling Diagram for up to 6 AIT-5 Tape Drives




Figure 5-7 TLS-412xxx Cabling Diagram for up to 12 AIT-5 Tape Drives

# 5.8 Securing the Cables to the TLS

Two adhesive backed cable tie mounts and hook and loop style cable ties are provided to secure the interconnect cables to be secured to the rear of the TLS. 


Figure 5-8 Example of Cables Secured to the Rear of the TLS

# 5.9 Initializing the Fibre Channel Option


After attaching all of the interconnect cables from the Fibre Channel Option to the library, disconnect (if connected) the Fibre Channel Option from the FC host or Hub to avoid affecting any operational systems.

#### NOTE

Refer to the applicable TLS Installation and Operation manual for instructions on using the TLS Library and its menus.

Attach the power cord to the FCO and then push the power switch to the on position. Apply power to the TLS library. During initialization, the library will reposition the cartridge handler and tape magazine carrousel. The tape drives and magazines will be scanned to inventory the contents of the library. The third line of the LCD displays the status of these operations.

If the Fibre Channel Option (FCO) is enabled and busy, it will also display status information on the third line of the LCD. If there is more than one message to be displayed, they will cycle at one-second intervals. Table 4-8 shows the possible messages that can appear while the FCO is initializing.



On single Fibre Channel Option installations, status messages are prefixed with "FC:".

Pressing the ENTER key will clear the message.

This warning message can be caused by an incorrectly installed serial cable. If the message reoccurs after checking the cables and clearing the message using the EN-TER key several times, it may require power cycling the library, to reset the FCO. If this problem occurs, please contact the Technical Support department at Qualstar so that corrective action can be taken.

The initialization procedure can take up to several minutes. If the host system is started while FCO status messages are still present, the host may miss seeing the Fibre Channel devices because the system is still busy. The host should be instructed to scan for Fibre Channel devices after the FCO has been configured and line three is clear in the TLS Library's LCD display.

# 5.10 Configuring the Fibre Channel Loop ID

The Id Mode must be configured for either "Soft" or "Fixed" addressing. Using "Soft" addressing, the Fibre Channel Option connects to an arbitrated loop using the first available AL\_PA, scanning from the highest valid address to the lowest. Using "Fixed" addressing, the user selects a specific arbitrated loop address (AL\_PA) to connect with. If the selected address is not available, the Fibre Channel Option will connect with the first available address it finds. The use of "Soft" or "Fixed" addressing is based on the user's installation requirements.

Soft addressing can be configured when address conflicts are not likely. If the Fibre Channel Option is connected directly to the computer's HBA (Host Bus Adapter), the selection of a specific Loop Id is not usually required. For example, Emulex HBA drivers scan for an available address starting from the low Fibre Channel address range. The FCO begins scanning for an available address starting from the high Fibre Channel address range. This avoids address conflicts and the FCO Loop Id will be assigned the same value each time it is restarted.

Hard addressing should be configured if address conflicts can occur. This can happen if the FCO is connected to a Fibre Channel Hub. Since many HBA drivers map the Fibre Channel Loop Id to a SCSI Bus/Target address, this mandates that the Fibre Channel Loop Id be very stable, and cannot be allowed to change if the system is simply restarted. This might happen if soft addressing were used and the Fibre Channel Option found its previous address taken. Selecting a fixed address is a way to prevent the FCO Loop Id from changing if the system is restarted.

If the computer's HBA uses the World Wide Port Name (WWPN) convention instead of the Loop Id to map to a SCSI Bus/Target/Lun address, the value of the Loop Id is no longer important. The WWPN is always unique and consistent under all conditions. In the future, all addressing will likely use the WWPN.

The Configuration\Fibre Channel menu panel displays the SCSI device interface and configures the Fibre Channel Interface to host. The menu sets the Fibre Channel Option host topology. The Fibre Channel option 648-0003-0 provides two FC host ports. These two ports provide a redundant connection to the router. Each is independently configured as port 0 and port 1.

The "Topology" has two selections, LOOP and FABRIC. The LOOP selection configures the Fibre Channel port for Arbitrated Loop (FC-AL) operation. The FABRIC selection configures the Fibre Channel port for Switch Fabric (FC\_SW) operation. If the mode is LOOP, the Id Mode and Loop Id entries are available. The Id Mode menu item has two selections, FIXED or SOFT. If the mode is FIXED, the Loop Id entry is displayed. If the Id Mode is SOFT, the Loop ID is automatically assigned by the FCO.

During the Fibre Channel Arbitrated Loop (FC-AL) initialization process, a unique Arbitrated Loop Physical Address (AL\_PA) value is assigned to each port on the loop. Not all of the 256 hex values are allowed as AL\_PA values per FC-AL. The Loop Id value is used to represent the 126 addresses that the FCO can use. Table 7-1 shows how a Loop Id value maps to an AL\_PA. If the Id Mode is "SOFT", the FCO will attempt to obtain an available Loop Id, in the following order: 0, 1, 2, etc.

# 5.11 Configuring the Fibre Channel SCSI Devices Interface

To establish the SCSI device configuration the Fibre Channel Option is commanded to "Rescan" its six SCSI device buses. The six SCSI device channels, starting with Channel 0, begin scanning for SCSI devices using ascending SCSI Target Ids. After all six channels have been scanned, the FCO builds a SCSI device table, that it uses to map SCSI Targets to the host as logical devices (LUNs).

Press the (UP) or (DOWN) key to move the pointer to Device. Press the ENTER key to enter the Configuration\Fibre Channel\Device menu.




#### Figure 6-1 Rear View of the ATTO Fibre Channel Bridge/Router (FCO)






Figure 6-4 TLS-412xxx Cabling Diagram for up to 6 AIT Tape Drives




Figure 6-5 TLS-412xxx Cabling Diagram for up to 12 AIT Tape Drives




Figure 7-1 The TLS Configuration Menu (Part 1)




Figure 7-2 The TLS Configuration Menu (Part 2)

The Configuration menu is used to customize the operation of the TLS to meet the system requirements. The Configuration menu consists of several sub-menus, some affecting the unit's interaction with the SCSI system, and others affecting the unit's interaction with the user. Once the items in the Configuration menu have been customized, the Configuration menu should not have to be revisited, unless the configuration of the changer or the SCSI system (e.g. adding or removing tape drives) is changed.

The following sections explain the Fibre Channel menus in detail. An explanation of the remaining menu items are contained in the specific TLS models Technical Service Manual. Not all values or menu items appear at all times; some depend upon the model of library in use, other configuration parameters and incomplete prerequisite conditions.

#### NOTE

The menus in this chapter reflect revision 2.26 of the Executive PCBA EPROM software. If an earlier revision of the software is being used, some menu items may not appear in the menus.

Additionally, the menus in this chapter represent both single bay and dual bay libraries. Menu items that are specific to dual bay libraries contain the words "Left or Right" or the letters "L or R".

The Legends in Figure 7-1 and Figure 7-2 indicate the types of digits found in the value items of the Configuration menu's sub-menus. An explanation of each type is given below in Figure 7-3.

This menu permits control of certain aspects of the Fiber Channel Options operation.

#### 7.4.1 Alarm

An audible alarm on the Fibre Channel Option interface is sounded if a warning or error event is reported by the Fibre Channel Option.

- YES If the Alarm value is set to YES, the audible alarm is enabled.
- NO If the Alarm value is set to NO, the audible alarm is disabled.

## 7.4.2 Ch0 / Ch1 FC Speed (Fibre Channel Type B and C)

This value is a selection AUTO, 1Gb or 2Gb, that corresponds to the FC link speed. If AUTO, the link will attempt to negotiate the highest possible speed of 2Gb. If the Selection is 1Gb, the link will only negotiate the lower 1Gb speed. If the selection is 2Gb, the link will only negotiate the higher 2Gb speed. The number of entries will depend on the Fibre Channel Option selected.

The default is AUTO.

## 7.4.3 Ch0..Ch5 SCSI ID (Fibre Channel Type B and C)

This value is a number from 0 to 15 that corresponds to the SCSI Channel (0..5) initiator id. The number of entries will depend on the Fibre Channel Option selected.

The default SCSI Id is 7.

## 7.4.4 Ch0..Ch5 SCSI Speed (Fibre Channel Type B and C)

This value is a selection 160, 80, or 40, that corresponds to the highest negotiated SCSI bus speed of the FC SCSI Channel 0..5 Initiator. The number of entries will depend on the Fibre Channel Option selected.

The Configuration\Advanced\Fibre Channel (Left or Right) \Set Time menu is used to set the Fibre Channel Option's real time clock. The date and time values that are displayed are not current. They reflect the values obtained from the last Fibre Channel power-on or configuration update.

The Fibre Channel Option uses the real time clock to timestamp log events. Note that the time is not critical to normal operations.

This value is a number from 1 to 31.

The Configuration\Fibre Channel menu is used to configure the Fibre Channel Option to the host.

## 7.6.1 Id Mode (Left or Right)

This value represents the Id Mode, which must be configured for either "Soft" or "Fixed" addressing. Using "Soft" addressing, the Fibre Channel Option connects to an arbitrated loop using the first available AL\_PA, scanning from the highest valid address to the lowest. Using "Fixed" addressing, the user selects a specific arbitrated loop address (AL\_PA) to connect with. If the selected address is not available, the Fibre Channel Option will connect with the first available address it finds

FIXEDThe "Loop Id" entry is displayed.SOFTThe Loop Id is automatically assigned by the Fibre Channel loop

insertion protocol.

## 7.6.2 Loop Id (Left or Right)

During the Fibre Channel Arbitrated Loop (FC-AL) initialization process, a unique Arbitrated Loop Physical Address (AL\_PA) value is assigned to each port on the loop. Not all of the 256 hex values are allowed as AL\_PA values per FC-AL. The Loop Id value is used to represent the 126 addresses that the Fibre Channel Option can use.

Table 7-1 shows how a Loop Id value maps to an AL\_PA. If "SOFT" is requested for the "Loop Id", the Fibre Channel Option will attempt to obtain an available Loop Id, in the following order: 0, 1, 2, etc.

## 7.6.3 Topology 0 / Topology 1 (Left or Right)

This value sets the Fibre Channel Option host topology. The "Topology" has two selections, LOOP and FABRIC. The LOOP selection configures the Fibre Channel Option for Arbitrated Loop (FC-AL) operation. The FABRIC selection configures the Fibre Channel Option for Switch Fabric (FC\_SW) operation. If the mode is LOOP, the Id Mode and Loop Id entries are available.

- **LOOP** The LOOP value configures the Fibre Channel Option for Arbitrated LOOP (FC-AL) operation.
- FABRIC The FABRIC value configures the Fibre Channel Option for Switch Fabric (FC\_SW) operation.

The Configuration\Fibre Channel\Device (Left or Right) menu displays a listing of the SCSI devices attached to the Fibre Channel Option. This menu presents a list of the first 16 LUN assignments.

## 7.7.1 RESCAN

Invoking this command will cause the Fibre Channel Option to rescan the buses for SCSI devices. Note, the RESCAN command will disrupt host communication, so a warning message will be displayed. When the warning message appears, press the ENTER key to continue the RESCAN operation.

#### CAUTION

The RESCAN operation should be performed with the Library disconnected from the host. The Fibre Channel Option is restarted and SCSI device address maybe modified.




Figure 8-1 The TLS Maintenance Menu (Part 1)




Figure 8-2 The TLS Maintenance Menu (Part 2)

The Maintenance menu is used to display detailed information about the TLS and its operating history, and to test the functionality of the liquid crystal display and menu control keys. The Maintenance menu is available to the system user and is considered safe. The user cannot break anything by using, or misusing, this menu. Diagrams showing the entire structure of the Maintenance menu system are shown in Figure 8-1 and Figure 8-2.

The following sections explain the Fibre Channel menus in detail. An explanation of the remaining menu items are contained in the specific TLS models Technical Service Manual. Not all values or menu items appear at all times; some depend upon the model of library in use, other configuration parameters and incomplete prerequisite conditions.

The Maintenance menu contains multiple Display items. Display items look like the sub-menus found in the Configuration and Operation menus, but they generally do not contain editable values or executable functions. We prefer to call the Display items status screens, because they display the present status of various TLS elements.

#### NOTE

Sub-menus for single bay libraries and dual side libraries with only one Fibre Channel Option installed are displayed as being non-side specific.

Dual bay libraries that have Fibre Channel Options installed on both the left and right sides will display Left and Right sub-menu's.

# 8.2 Maintenance\Fibre Channel Menu

The Fibre Channel menu is partitioned into status screens, Info and Log. The Info screen displays version and environmental information from the Fibre Channel Option. The Log screen accesses and displays the Fibre Channel Option's internal event log.

# 8.3 Maintenance\Fibre Channel\Info (Left or Right) Status Screen

The Fibre Channel Info status screen displays the Fibre Channel Option's configuration and environmental information. The displayed information was obtained at power-on, from the last configuration change, or from the last UPDATE request.

## 8.3.1 Backplane Id

This value identifies the type of backplane. The value of 001 should be displayed for type B Fibre Channel Options. Type C FCOs will display the value of 007.

## 8.3.2 Base Lvl

This value identifies the base-level revision.

## 8.3.3 Board Rev

This value identifies the board level revision.

#### 8.3.4 CPLD Rev

This value identifies the CPLD revision.

#### 8.3.5 Memory (MB)

This value specifies the amount of memory.

#### 8.3.6 Daughtr Bd Id

This value identifies the type of daughter board.

### 8.3.7 FW Rev

This value identifies the firmware revision.

#### 8.3.8 Loader Rev

This value identifies the loader revision.

#### 8.3.9 Prod. Id.

This value identifies the product model name.

#### 8.3.10 S/N

This value identifies the board serial number.

## 8.3.11 +2.5V (Type C FCO only)

This value displays the +2.5V voltage.

#### 8.3.12 +3.3V

This value displays the +3.3V voltage.

#### 8.3.13 +5V

This value displays the +5V voltage.

#### 8.3.14 +12V (Type B and C FCOs only)

This value displays the +12V voltage.

### 8.3.15 Air Temp

This value displays the board's temperature in degrees Celsius.

## 8.3.16 CPU Temp (Type B and C FCOs only)

This value displays the CPU's temperature in degrees Celsius.

#### 8.3.17 UPDATE

This menu item is visible when communications to the Fibre Channel Option is in an idle state. Invoking this command will cause the Fibre Channel Option to update the configuration and environmental information.

It takes approximately 35 seconds to obtain new information after the UPDATE command has been invoked.

# 8.4 Maintenance\Fibre Channel\ Log (Left or Right) Status Screen

The Fibre Channel Log status screen displays the Fibre Channel Option's internal event log. The information is provided to assist in troubleshooting problems and is not required for normal library operation. The event log is saved in non-volatile memory and is not lost when the library power is removed.

The first line in the status screen indicates the Fibre Channel Option selected. The second line contains the event sequence number and a timestamp. Lines three and four contain event text description. If the second line ends with an up arrow, newer events are available for viewing. If the last line ends with a down arrow, older events are available for viewing. These older or newer events can be viewed by using the

(UP) and (DOWN) keys to scroll the display. Since the event data is stored in the Fibre Channel Option, a small time delay occurs after each request to retrieve the information for display.




Figure 8-3 Log Status Screen Sample

# 9.1 Repacking the Fibre Channel Option

With the exception of Fibre Channel Options that are shipped from the factory installed on libraries, the FCO was originally shipped in a specially-designed carton. When shipping the FCO, use the original shipping carton and packing materials. If the original shipping carton and packing materials are not available, order new shipping materials by calling Qualstar Technical Support.


# 9.2 **Preparation for Packing Type C Fibre Channel Options**

### CAUTION

Be sure to turn the library's power off before installing or removing a Fibre Channel Option.

Prepare the FCO for packing as follows:

- **1.** Remove power from the TLS: first turn the power switch off and then remove the power cord.
- 2. If the FCO is connected the FC host or Hub, disconnect it.
- **3.** Carefully remove the SFP (Small Form Factor Pluggable) adapter from the FCO. They are located in the bottom of the FCO. See Figure 9-1. Store the SFP adapter in a safe location.





Figure 9-2 Fibre Channel Option in Closed and Open Positions

4. Using a Phillips screwdriver, loosen the four captive screws on the FCO (see Figure 9-2) and carefully guide the FCO backwards as it pivots on the hinges and comes to its open position. See Figure 9-2.

#### CAUTION

SCSI Bus ribbon cables are fragile and can be damaged by pulling on the cable instead of the pull-tab provided at each connector.


**5.** Carefully disconnect the AUXPWR cable from the PWRIN connector on the Fibre Channel Option. See Figure 9-3.

- **6.** Carefully disconnect the SERIAL ribbon cable from the FCO\_A connector on the Fibre Channel Option. For those FCOs that also have Q-Link, carefully disconnect the SERIAL ribbon cable from the Q\_Link connector on the FCO. See Figure 9-3.
- 7. Slowly lift the FCO until it touches the rear of the TLS. Using a Phillips screwdriver, secure the Fibre Channel Option to the rear of the TLS by tightening the two top captive screws. See Figure 9-4.

- 8. Remove the two screws from the hinges on the FCO. Save the screws for future use.
- **9.** While supporting the FCO with one hand, loosen the two captive screws at the top of the FCO.
- **10.** Carefully remove the FCO unit from the rear of the library.

# 9.3 **Preparation for Packing Type B Fibre Channel Options**

### CAUTION

Be sure to turn the library's power off before installing or removing a Fibre Channel Option.




Figure 9-5 Rear View of the Type B Fibre Channel Bridge/Router (FCO)

- **1.** Remove power from the FCO: first turn the power switch off and then remove the power cord.
- **2.** Remove power from the TLS: first turn the power switch off and then remove the power cord.
- 3. If the FCO is connected the FC host or Hub, disconnect it.
- 4. Disconnect any SCSI cables (SCSI 0 through SCSI 5) from the rear of the FCO.
- 5. Disconnect the cable from the serial connector on the FCO.
- **6.** If the FCO is mounted in a rack, cabinet or other location detach it and it will be ready for packing.

# 9.4 **Preparation for Packing ATTO Fibre Channel Options**

#### CAUTION

Be sure to turn the library's power off before installing or removing a Fibre Channel Option.




Figure 9-6 Rear View of the ATTO Fibre Channel Bridge/Router (FCO)

- **1.** Remove power from the FCO: first turn the power switch off and then remove the power cord.
- **2.** Remove power from the TLS: first turn the power switch off and then remove the power cord.
- 3. If the FCO is connected the FC host or Hub, disconnect it.
- 4. Disconnect any SCSI cables (SCSI 1 and SCSI 2) from the rear of the FCO.
- **5.** Disconnect the cable from the serial port or Ethernet connectors on the FCO, if connected.
- **6.** If the FCO is mounted in a rack, cabinet or other location detach it and it will be ready for packing.

# 9.5 Packing the Fibre Channel Option

**1.** Using the packing material that came with the FCO, place the FCO into the shipping carton and seal with shipping tape.
